This concert is an effort to intimately explore Ravel—the man and his music. A deeply moving novella about Ravel by a wonderful novelist Jean Echenoz will help us hear Ravel's music in a new light.

The novella opens in 1928 as Maurice Ravel—a dandy, an eccentric, and a curmudg-eon—crosses the Atlantic to begin his triumphant grand tour of the United States. Meanwhile, I would love to ask you to imagine and fantasize the rest of the story.
